Of course, there's a little more to finding a great camping spot than just pulling over and hoping for the best. Plan ahead

Just as you would book a hotel before you leave on a vacation, it's best to make reservations for your RV trip. It's important to plan ahead regardless if you're staying at a private RV park or a campground on public property.

Public or private?

From basic accommodations to luxury RV resorts, you have many choices. State and national parks tend to have simple campgrounds, but they often offer the best in natural beauty! Whether you go public or private, you'll want to consider whether the site has hookups for your RV, how much you're willing to spend, and how close you'll be to the attractions you want to visit — particularly if you aren't towing a separate car and need to use the RV for all of your travel.

What about parking lots?

Some shopping centers and truck stops will allow overnight camping, while rest areas generally prohibit it. Always be certain that you have permission to camp before setting up for the night.

The Family Motor Coach Association recommends the following if you stay in a private parking lot:

- A Park out of the way
- Avoid using slide-outs and awnings if possible
- Do not use your leveling jacks on asphalt
- Limit your stay to one night and leave the area cleaner than you found it
- A Purchase fuel, food, or supplies as a thank-you when feasible
- Do not put personal items, such as chairs or a grill, outside

How to find campgrounds

RV campground directories are available at bookstores, libraries, and

some RV supply stores; they can be very useful to keep with you as you travel. You can also contact local and state tourism bureaus for camping information. Naturally, you have plenty of online resources to choose from as well:

<u>Supplies:</u> A Face-cloth Ribbon Googly Eyes Double-sided Sticky Pads An Easter Egg

Directions:

Fold the face-cloth in half forming a triangle. Roll the face-cloth from the points towards the long edge. Then fold this in half and place the Easter Egg in the center of the fold. Tie the ribbon around the "neck" of the bunny. Tie another bow higher up, to create the bunny "face" and the "ears" above. Using the double sided sticky pads, attach the eyes.

Who Can be Excluded on My Workers Compensation Policy?

In the state of New Hampshire, depending on the type of entity, owners and/or some officers of a business have the option of being excluded from Workers Compensation coverage. Sole-proprietors and partnerships are two entities which allow the owners to



opt out of coverage without formally filing an exclusion form with the state. For other entities such as corporations, limited liability companies, and non-profits only three officers and/or members can be excluded at one time. Any additional officers or members are included using their actual payroll or minimum payroll if they do not collect a wage. It is important to note that if the exclusion form is not completed for these entities, all officers and/or members are considered (by the state) to be included and you will be charged for coverage accordingly.
